The PAGB 'masters of print' is closing soon

Why not send an entry? - Think you've no chance of getting something accepted? - You'd be wrong! - No prequalification required - open to any SPF Club Member to enter – Everyone who enters automatically gets a quality colour catalogue.

Only 29 Scottish authors entered the Masters of Print last year, but 10 of those gained acceptances in to the restricted Exhibition of 60 prints, from 60 different authors. Four of those Scottish authors won some of the top Individual medals, and in addition six of those 10 Scottish authors won a main sponsor's prize at the Exhibition, including one Scottish photographer, who won a Canon Pixma Pro 1 A3+ Inkjet Printer!

Scottish photographers punch well above their weight in PAGB Competitions. After all, we are the FIAP World Champions, having beaten the PAGB in more than on FIAP Biennial recently.

'There's still time if you haven't already entered. I entered last year, gained one of the limited 60 acceptances, won Inkjet paper and received a colour catalogue and a limited edition badge, as well as a few free paper samples handed out at the exhibition' - John McVie, SPF President

Complete your titles and details online along with a high resolution file for each print you want to enter, then send your unmounted prints (A3) to arrive by the deadline. SPF Digital Championship 2018 Opens for Entries Soon

The 2018 SPF Digital Championship will be held on Sunday 18 November 2018 at Stirling Court Hotel. **Online Entry** will open very soon and will close on 4 November - see more details below.



The SPF Digital Championship is a club competition for projected digital images (PDIs), held in November each year. It is judged, in front of an audience, by three judges. Entries are submitted in advance by the club. Club and individual awards are made.

After two rounds the top 8 Clubs contest the Final, the remaining clubs contest the Plate Trophy. The top two clubs from the Final are invited to represent the SPF at the PAGB Digital Championship held the following July.

As well as the Club Competition, the following Individual Awards will again be presented. Best Creative, Best Portrait, Best Landscape, and Best Nature**, as well as Best Overall and Judges' Choices. ** the SPF continues to use the FIAP Definition of Nature.


All SPF Club Members are invited to attend this event, whether you, or your club, have entered the competition. Come along to a great day and see over 700 Projected Images from all over Scotland. More details will be available soon.

The format of this competition remains the same, with Clubs choosing their entries from a Bank of Images (minimum 20 images; and Maximum 40) The maximum image size is 1600px X 1200px, but we continue to accept smaller sizes.

All entries **must** be submitted online by the Club Competition Secretary. The process for Online Entry has been changed slightly for this year, to rule out the problems we had last year. New Guidance Notes are now available.

Please ensure we have details of your Competition Secretary who will deal with this entry as they require to be entered in to our website system before they can gain access to complete this entry. Club Competition Secretaries or Club Main Contacts registered with the SPF have been sent an email with full details – If you haven't received this please contact Libby on libby.neilsmith@btinternet.com

How can you distinguish between what is allowed, and what is not, allowed when entering SPF, PAGB or FIAP Competitions?

The SPF, PAGB and FIAP all have their own statements of what is allowed. The SPF and PAGB are currently the same – 'Images entered must be entirely the work of the photographer. Composite Images are permitted provided all component images meet this requirement. For the avoidance of doubt, use of images from any source including, but not limited to, royalty free image banks, textures and clipart are not permitted'

An entry may also be subject to additional specific competition requirements, e.g. Nature or Monochrome Definitions.

This statement is not normally expanded upon, as it is difficult to police all aspects of what is meant by this statement which may vary, in interpretation, by different Judges and Competition Organisers. The SPF's advice, therefore, is that you should comply with the 'spirit' of the rules when entering Competitions. Common sense will tell you when you have gone too far.

The following, which follows this ethos, may also help but is not meant to be definitive, merely a guide.

'Images entered must be entirely the work of the photographer', does not preclude trade processed prints being entered but does mean that you should have taken any photographs or made any elements used.

'Royalty Free Images are not permitted', neither are images freely available to use for other purposes on the web, or elsewhere, or copyright images that you have purchased the right to use but did not take.

'Clip art' includes any other material available for you to use, whether free or that you have purchased the right to use but did not make. This includes photographing artwork/scrapbooking/crafting material that someone else made, and passing it off as your own. (Read the 'Plagiarism' article by Christine Widdall for more on this http://christinewiddall.co.uk/musings/plagiarism-photography/ - please note the SPF has asked permission of the author to circulate this. If you wish to circulate it to your members, so you must do likewise, unless as part of this document)

The following Q and A has been put together from questions received recently.

Q - To use a FILTER from within Photoshop to create a rain-drop effect say - is that allowed? as an example for simplicity

A - Yes, provided it is only using picture material from within your photograph(s) to create the effect (as opposed to say Filter > Render > Photo Frame (or Tree) within Photoshop, for example, where a complete Photo Frame (or Tree) is imported in to your image from a selection in Photoshop's library) – If it adds an 'image layer' that was not created from your own work, then it's not allowed. For complex Filters/Plug-Ins this should give a gauge as to what is acceptable.

The use of Textures, not created by yourself, should not be used for the same reason as above. The use of non-standard Brushes e.g. birds/snowflakes and the like, not created by yourself, falls in to the same category as above.

Q - To create something digitally in Photoshop like a non-existing planet - is that allowed?

A - Yes, the PAGB and SPF allow you to create elements (graphics or artwork) to use within your images; however this is not now allowed in FIAP Competitions unless it is solely created from your own photographs.

Q - The use of text from within Photoshop - is that allowed? my understanding is that it should not be because that is not your font

A - Theoretically you are correct, although it is unlikely that your image would be disqualified for this, but this is not now allowed in FIAP Competitions

Q - If I make the font myself and use that as a text from within Photoshop - is that allowed?

A - Yes, but this is not now allowed in FIAP Competitions

FIAP - This section is relevant only to events with FIAP Patronage e.g. Scottish Salon, Edinburgh International.. or FIAP Biennials and Clubs World Cup and does not affect any other SPF Competitions.

The current FIAP rules now state (017 and 018/2017) – 'All the parts of each submitted image have to be photographed by the author who must be in possession of the original unretouched 'capture' version(s) of the image and where applicable of all component parts of the image. The author must also hold the copyright to each submitted image and of all component parts of it.'

Additionally FIAP say – 'that all parts of the image have to be photographed by the author who is holding the copyright of all works submitted.' Any person who is found guilty of using photographic material that was not captured in camera by that person will be excluded for life from FIAP activities.

Any author, whose image shows any suspicions about the compliance with FIAP regulations or definitions, can be requested by the organiser or by FIAP, to submit the original capture file (file containing the data recorded by the sensor; i.e.: the RAW or the original unretouched JPEG files) plus the file of the images immediately before and immediately following the questionable image.

i.e. the following underlined is no longer allowed in FIAP events – 'Images may be altered, either digitally or otherwise, by the maker. <u>Artwork or computer graphics created by the entrant may be incorporated</u> if the photographic content predominates; subject to nature, Photo Travel and Photojournalism divisional restrictions'. - This is still however the PSA statement, meaning this is allowed in PSA Patronage only Exhibitions.




Even if you miss out on selection, you can become part of the Salon Refusés, which is hired by lots of Clubs to give a great evening's entertainment.
